Dear Gossard:

I have acknowledgment of our letter of October 1st with reference to the shingle situation. We very seldom have a call for extra stars. It means quite a little to us however, at times, to be able to put in perfect brand clears and sometimes helps us to get an order, especially from the smaller yards. However, the dealers can and most of them do order their shingles in straight cars at slightly lower prices than mixed with lumber.

I have noted your comments with reference to prices. Our price on uppers is satisfactory. Some of the mills as you of course know, are considerably under us, particularly on inch common and dimension, but I can pick up some business for you and it will be my pleasure to do so.

I am putting out a circular today at \$2.00 off on 20' and shorter and \$2.50 off on inch common. If you have a surplus of 1" and want to move it I expect this price really should be \$3.00 off, however, this will make very little difference on the average order for the small country dealer. We now have a number of customers in the territory that are willing to give us preference on White River stock.


I have also noted that some of our competitors who have been very solicitous of getting the White River account in this territory have had quite a little to say to the dealers not at all complimentary to our lumber. A number of the dealers have told me that some of our competitors have advised them against using White River stock and that it was all hemlock. It is perfectly satisfactory to me to have them do this. If we can have our competitors advertise us it will save me a lot of expense in keeping our stock before the trade.

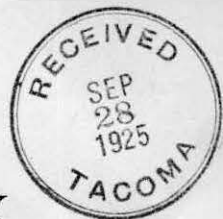

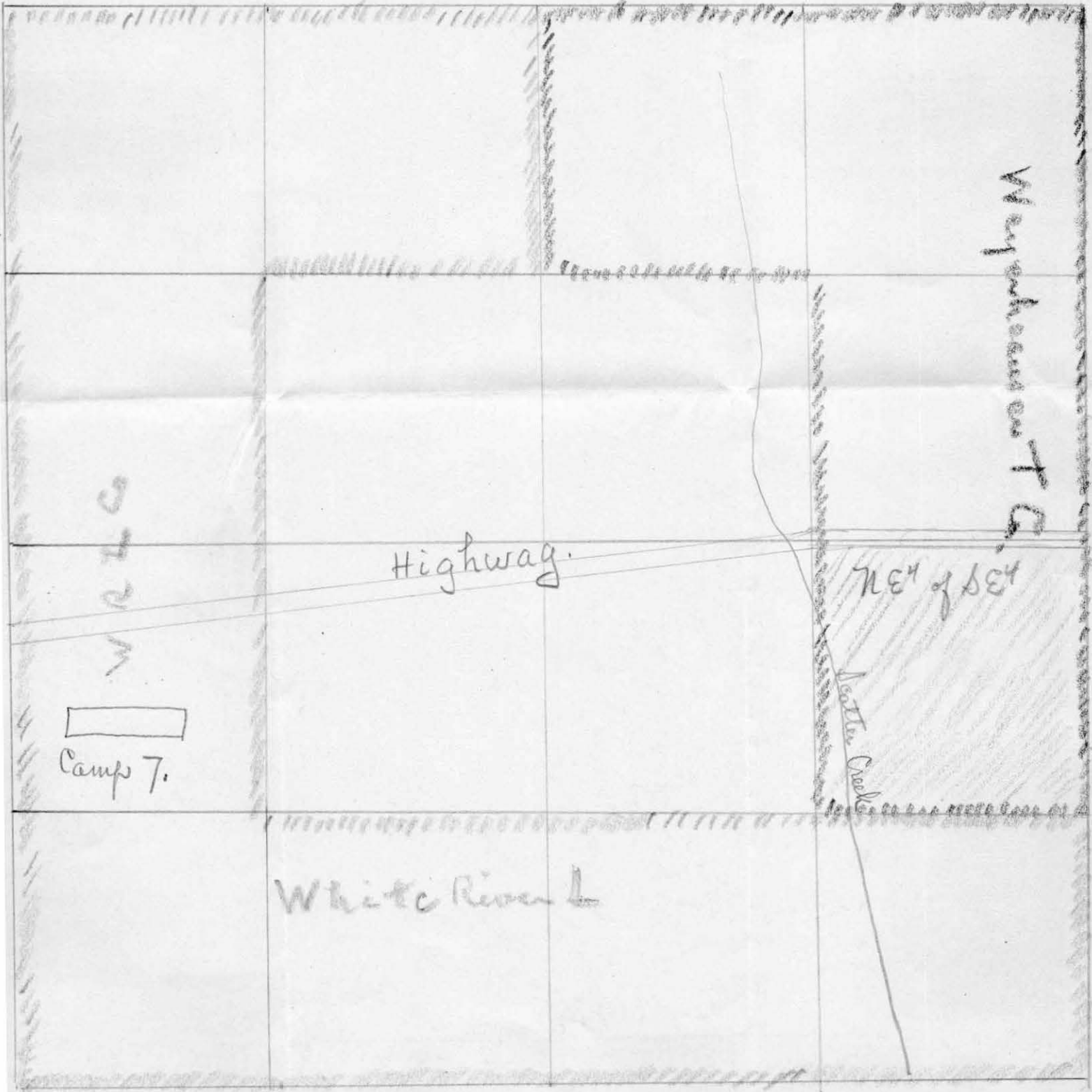

Dear Sir:

Thanks for your favor of the 10th enclosing map showing your lands colored in green in Townships 20 North Range 7 and 8 East and Townships 19 North, Ranges 7, 8 and 9 East.

The only intelligent way to talk exchange, of course, is to get very familiar with the country by an actual survey, which has in mind the possibilities of railway development, but from our records here, what we own north of the river in Townships 20 North Range 7 East and 20 North of Range 8 East, constitutes the very cream of our holdings up the White River, and by this we are referring specially to Sections 25 and 35 in Township 20 North of Range 7 East and to Sections 29, 31, 33, 34 and 35 in Township 20 North of Range 8 East. We certainly do not want to part with this nor any part of it, and while I appreciate your anxiety to get into Sections 25 and 35 in 20 - 7 East, it would open up that proposition in a way that would spoil it for our holdings beyond. Our intention is to log in that country, and as we own timber on four sides of Section 36 - 20 - 7 East, we naturally would expect to acquire this section also, when it was put up for sale by the State, and you can see at once what a fine block of timber that would give us to open up a logging camp. I do not think that we want to spoil this chance.

Mr. Hansen - 2 -

The timber which each of us have in the south part of 19 - 8 East and 19 - 9 East is a long ways off for development and much of it I am inclined to think carrying a load of hemlock and a low grade of fir which does not make it very desirable for an exchange. We probably have even more of that kind of timber than you, but it is the last timber to be logged in that country and I cannot imagine there is any particular reason why we should be anxious at the present time to exchange it.

However, I will give this matter further thought and try to get around to some suggestion before long, but manifestly we would not want to trade the timber which we have north of the river for any timber which you have south of the river.

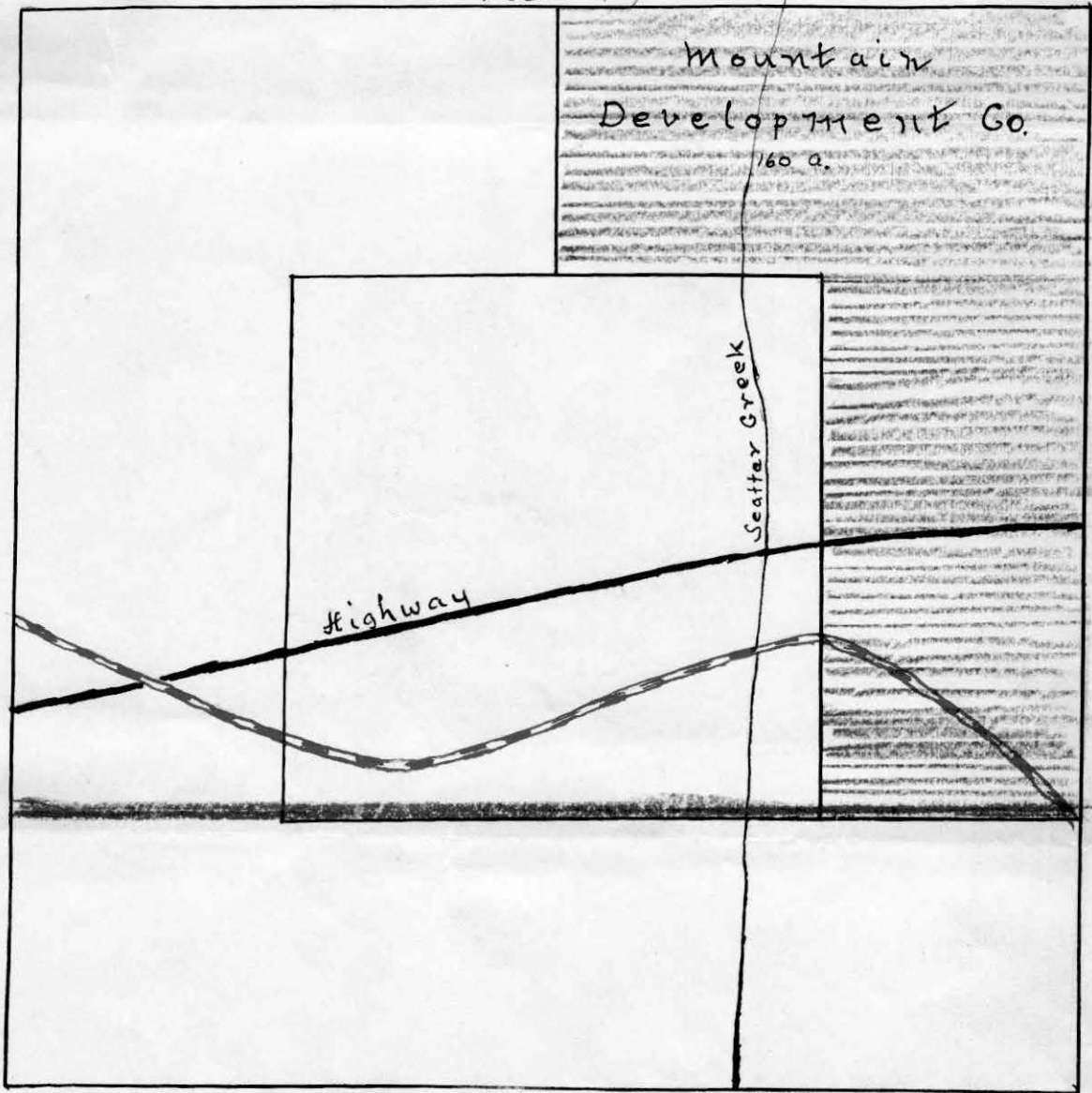

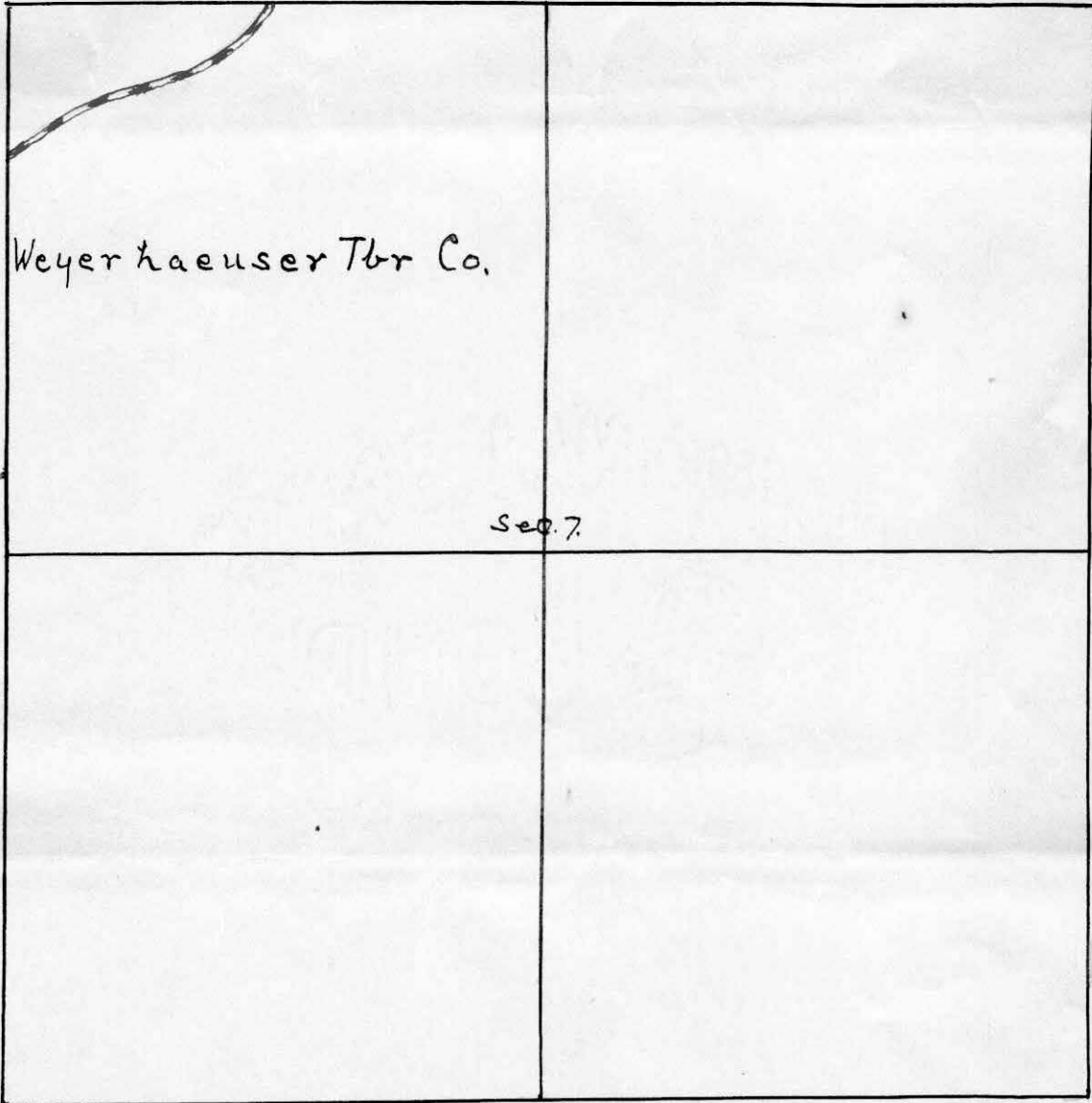

Logging Road in Sec. 7. T. 19. R. 8 E.

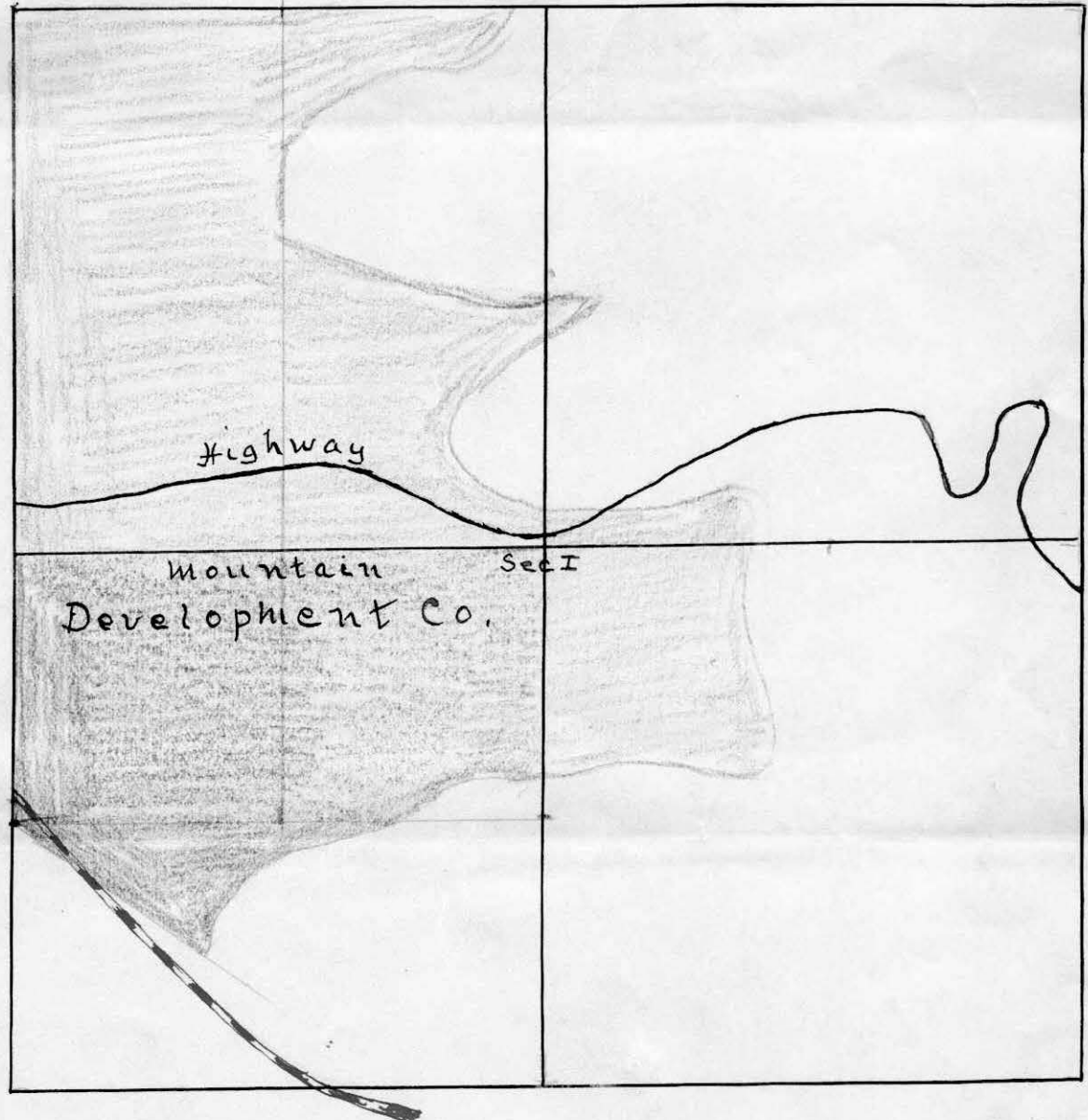

Mr. Minot Davis:

Attached please find plat of lands up White River the red lands being that which we own and the green the Milwaukee Land Company lands which have been purchased by our friend Mr. Hansen of the White River Lumber Company.

He is very anxious for us to trade with them and naturally wants to get north of the river and for us to take his timber south of the river. The map shows that in Section 35 - 20 7 East and Section 1 - 19 - 7 East there are some irregular lines, which represents property owned by Mountain Development Company, and we own the Mountain Development Company, so that that timber is available for our own use.

You will see from what I say how I have approached this subject with Mr. Hansen. I think that if we do exchange with him we can make a pretty good trade, but I dont think we want to be in a hurry about the exchange, but if there is any way for us to assemble topographical sketches of these townships, so as to give us some idea of the possible railway development, I would be glad to have this done.

Dear Mr. Hansen:

With reference to your suggestion of March 30th as it pertains to timber in the N $\frac{1}{2}$ of Section 25, we are going to depart from our usual practice in negotiations by sending you enclosed herewith our full cruise on all of Section 25, recently made by Mr. Fenton, and on the N $\frac{1}{2}$ of which he puts 31,173,000 ft., his cruise on the whole section being 62,599,000 ft. We had an old cruiser by the name of Cole on this section sixteen years ago, who found quite a little more fir and less hemlock than Fenton reports. Together with Mr. Fenton's report we are handing you another cruise, being a check cruise made by our Mr. Brigham on the NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 25, the total on this quarter section being 16,325,000 ft. as against Mr. Fenton's cruise on the same section of 16,032,000 ft.

Mr. Fenton reports more old growth than Mr. Brigham does, but in Mr. Brigham's comments he says that while there are a few very distinctive old growth trees, the predominating type is an intermediate grade that is smooth and a little difficult to class whether it is what cruisers call "Old Growth" or "Young Growth".

Then again we would like to invite your attention to the SW $\frac{1}{4}$ and the W $\frac{1}{2}$ of SE $\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 13 in this township, which before you move out we would like to have cleaned up if it is practical for you to do so. Our Mr. Davis has gone over all of

this matter very thoroughly, and at my request has made prices on it such as are suggested on the cruise reports themselves, and what I want to put up to you is whether there is anything the matter with the cruise for quantity or anything the matter with the price that is suggested, and if you think there is to tell me so frankly, returning to us for our files the cruises which are submitted.

Dear Mr Long:

We just received the analysis of costs and sales for the year 1924 and if you have no copy you will probably be interested to see ours. To me it is a guiding star and I read it very carefully. On the last page December report we fell down to the twentieth place on account of the cold weather. The ice in the pond and on the flume made operation very difficult so we closed down for two weeks and it shows quickly in the cost —

Mr B.R. Lewis wrote me what a good price the biggest and the best mills get and it shows here that the St Paul & Tacoma (the largest mill) got 32 cents less than we did and that Bloedel Donawaw (next largest) 25 cents less than our price. Figuring profits St Paul made 16⁴ or \$143,974⁴⁰ and Bloedel 12 cents or \$24,590⁴⁰. I think Bloedel next to Long Bell pays the biggest interest.

I will be looking for you next week. I am very anxious for you to come up and look at small timber.

Dear Mr. Long:

Mr. Olson and I were up the McClellan Pass Highway New Years Day to see what had happened. We found the big blow on the line between Section 5 and 6-19-8 and not on Section 1, as I first reported to you.

Section 6 was hurt the most. Outside of that point very little timber had blown down. The worse blow is on Section 13-20-7. This section is too high to log until Spring. Our switchback is up to it and this timber should be logged as soon as possible in the Spring.

We are on our last setting on Section 24-20-7 and the timber on the north side of Section 25 should go out while the tracks are there. The timber on Section 24 is all felled and bucked.

This last wind blew down some trees from Section 25 on our logs. We scaled these windfalls and found 7,692 ft. Fir, 4,112 ft. Hemlock and 10,179 ft. Spruce. We cannot see any way of getting our logs out but to take the windfalls at the same time.

I can come down to Tacoma any day you have time to see me. Perhaps we can make better progress on our deal after the yearly reports are finished.

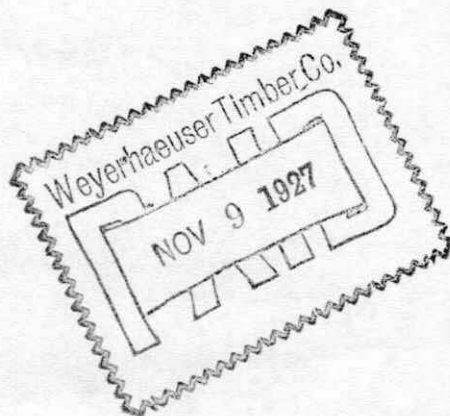

Noting your letter of Feb. 26th having to do with the mineral reservations which exist in the deed our company gave for the $S\frac{1}{2}$ of $SW\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 17 in Township 20 North of Range 6 East quite a few years ago in the same of the same, beg to say, it is quite apparent that Mr. W. It can only be done by the action of the Board of Directors at some one of their regular sessions and we have no prospective meeting of our directors until some time in May.

Would suggest that it might be in order for Mr. Smith to write the full details of all these affairs mentioned in your letter and present a request to see what could be done to straighten out this little difficulty that he is in, and I will at least submit it to the Board of Directors when they meet, although I am not at all confident that they would feel inclined to waive their rights

The land on the north half of north east quarter of Section 12 is a steep side hill and the railroad up the White River will have to be built on the side of this hill to get support. The country south is low and if we have to go across it would make an adverse grade of over one percent for a long distance. Also heavy construction.

We bought a 200 feet of right of way from the state in the north east quarter of the north east quarter and later the timber on the whole 40 acres. The state is figuring on relocating the highway from the bottom of the hill, half a mile east of our mill pond to Cyclone Creek. The survey has been made and it takes in this right of way we just acquired. We are going to put a shovel on this stretch of road and dig out our road bed and it would be a good idea to continue through Section 7 as per enclosed survey.

Any adjustment of the railroad afterwards will have to be made by the highway department. If this looks acceptable to you, please advise us.

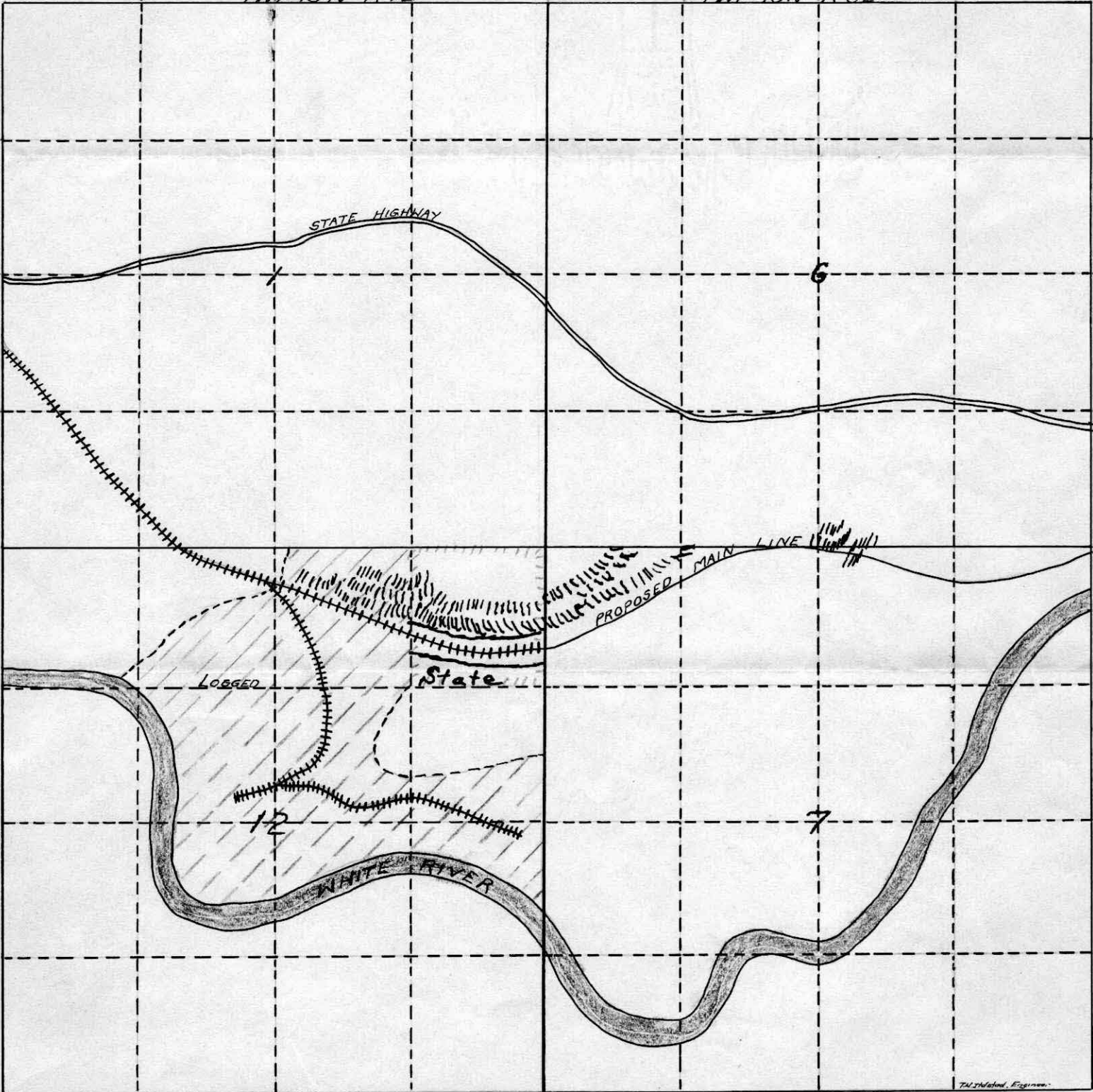





Apparently the Assessor is segregating timber values to lands not heretofore carrying a timber assessment. For instance, the timber on rights-of-way over Sections 2, 3, 4 and 5 of Township 19 North of Range 8 East and Section 33, Township 20 North of Range 8 East has apparently been segregated from the timber on the entire section. This timber has always been taxed as a unit and the owner of the section has paid such taxes as real property. Inasmuch as you own the remainder of these sections, I would suggest that you ask the Assessor not to disturb the present assessment. By segregating the timber on the right-of-way which segregation must presumably be more or less arbitrary they make themselves a lot of work and can only gain the small amount of discount which they do not allow on personal property taxes. You would be saving more or less grief and work and would be ahead the discount allowed on real property taxes.

In the final analysis the White River Lumber Company is paying the tax on all of the timber in the section and it seems to me that the assessment to you should be simplified as much as possible.

If I may make the suggestion, believe the best way for you to handle this would be to make an appointment with Mr. Brown, the Timber Deputy, and endeavor to get the assessment as simple and as correct as possible. As a rule Mr. Brown spends most of his time in the field, but is in the office every Saturday morning. You will find him a very pleasant gentleman to deal with.

Sorry to have missed you yesterday when you were in our office for a brief period, but referring to your letter of May 31st, I note with interest the comment you make about your production during the month of May, your sales, etc. and will await with much interest the figures, which you will be able to get showing the cost of production when you run full time as contrasted with the cost when you run five days a week.

Also note your further comments about some of the outstanding obligations of the White River Lumber Company, and especially your desire or preference to clean up your outstanding timber contracts as soon as possible. As I understand it, the indebtedness to the Northern Pacific maturing October 26, 1931 of \$50,000.00 is drawing 6% and the indebtedness to the Oriental Land & Improvement Company, consisting of two notes each of \$100,000.00, is an indebtedness drawing 5%.

Also note that the Hanson Family company have something like \$125,000.00 which they are willing to loan to the White River Lumber Company, and the rate, of course, I presume should be at 6%.

Page #2 - Mr. Hanson

I can see clearly why borrowing from this fund at 6% would be worth while and cancel the Northern Pacific indebtedness of \$50,000.00 which likewise draws 6% but to borrow money at 6% to pay off an indebtedness to the Oriental Land & Improvement Company that carries a 5% rate of interest has no special attractions for the White River Lumber Company unless there is some particular reason of importance to want to get the Oriental Land & Improvement Company indebtedness cleared up as soon as possible.

The changes are that the improvements now under way in the rebuilding of your planing mill, dry kiln and lumber yard will require more funds than we are likely to take in for the sale of lumber and this means that White River Lumber Company will have to borrow some money before that job is completed and pay 6% for it so that unless there is some very special reason for getting the Oriental Land & Improvement Company indebtedness out of the way, I think we had better carry that along at 5% instead of borrowing money to pay it off on which we would have to pay 6%. However, it is very kind of you to offer to loan White River Lumber Company this \$125,000.00 and there is no question but what White River Lumber Company would be glad to take it over at 6% just as fast as they are in need of any money for ordinary receipts. In fact, if you are particularly anxious to place the Hanson money out at 6% at the present time, it will be entirely satisfactory for White River Lumber Company to take over this amount, pay off what is due the Northern Pacific and the

and the residue of the fund can be applied to payment of the money due Weyerhaeuser Timber Company, which draws 6%, but I do not believe that I would pay off the Oriental Land & Improvement Co. indebtedness drawing 5% with money which I had to borrow at the rate of 6%.

By the way, whenever we do pay off the Northern Pacific we, of course, should remember to try and arrange to have the deed made in such a manner as will not embarrass us by any agreement we have relative to the guarantee on White River Lumber Company's part to see that the Northern Pacific gets all of the tonnage in that particular group of timber purchased from them. You will remember the discussions we had about this in the past and no doubt our Mr. Clapp, by personal interview with the officers in St. Paul, can arrange the matter to our entire satisfaction.

We are closing the Month of May today and as we have made this month a test month, we are anxious to find out the outcome. For two years we have run only five days a week and we never knew how much it cost us. This month we run twenty-seven full days and cut seven and a half million feet. The cost should be a very fair average. The cost is what we like to know and it will take ten days before we will know. Our sales price will be very low, nearly five dollars less than a year ago. Orders are not coming in from the Southwest so we will be about twenty cars short of last month in shipments. The retail will be a half million feet and the average price is somewhat higher.

Collections are not quite as good as at the beginning of the year. At the first of May our outstanding account had increased \$85,000.00 and we paid one note to the Northern Pacific of \$50,000.00. We still owe the Northern Pacific on

this contract \$50,000.00 due August 26, 1931. I am very anxious to pay this note and have the deed. Oriental Land and Improvement Company hold two notes of a hundred thousand each which I had hoped to pay ere this. The first one is due November 11th this year and the last one a year later. If business had held up we would have had enough lumber to sell to pay up all this indebtedness.

The Hanson family have on hand around a hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars and if you approve of it, we would like to lend it to the White River Lumber Company so we can take up some of these notes. I will be in Tacoma Tuesday to the meeting and will come to your office in further conference in this matter.

I know you have been very busy this week so I have kept away from Tacoma since I got back.



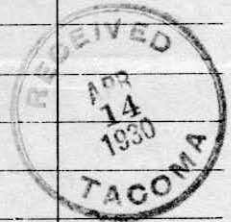

On Tuesday we had our annual meeting of the White River Lumber Company at which time Mr. Hanson made the statement that he would have to borrow \$100,000.00 for his taxes.

It occurred to me at that time, as it has in the past, that it would be profitable for the Weyerhaeuser Timber Company, so long as it has available funds, to loan the White River Lumber Company money under the same terms and conditions as would exist should they get this money from the bank. This would mean at least $1\frac{1}{2}\%$ in excess of what we are now receiving and in a case like this would be a short time loan assuming of course that business conditions are going to pick up to the point where we can move our lumber more freely.

Looking at it in another light, we own something in excess of 60% of this company and necessarily would be paying out 60% of any interest money with which the White River Lumber Company was charged. I would appreciate it very much if you would give me your reactions to such a line and the policy which you think we should pursue in such instances.

Business is not picking up as fast as we had hoped, although our rail orders are coming in a little better each day.

Dear Mr. Hanson:

Again I wish to acknowledge receipt of your letter of January 21st enclosing statement of your December business, as well as your net results for the year 1929, which shows as I interpret it, a profit of \$225,154.82. I consider this showing a most excellent one, taking into consideration the large percentage of your product which is either Hemlock or White Fir or Noble Fir.

Of course, when another year rolls on, your company will have to pay a great deal heavier bill for taxes and the only way to offset this increased burden, will be either to get better prices for your lumber and likewise get a larger production. Of course, the production cannot be increased a very great deal until the time is right for a night run and not until we get your planing mill moved and a new yard established at the saw mill. However, we can cross the bridge when we come to it, but I am satisfied that if any lumber concern in western Washington can show a profit in the future, it is going to be your company.

I note your reference to the presence of Mr. Orr in your office, who together with your Office Manager, is arranging for a new set of books and proper entries, etc., and I think by the time they get through with this work they will find it quite satisfactory in every way and not very much more expensive to inaugurate and carry on than has been your system in the past.

Also feel that there are not any very serious problems ahead of either one of us in perfecting the titles which Mr. Metzger has called to our attention and that while it may take some little time to straighten out these matters, it will not

involve a very great deal of expense and will never amount to very much, if anything, that is serious.

We will have quite a bunch of loggers and lumbermen here in Phoenix. Among them is Mr. Bordeaux and his family and Mr. Alex Polson and his family, together with Mrs. Anderson of the firm of Anderson & Middleton, who by the way is the mother in law of young Mr. Polson's wife. Also Mr. Mark Reed and his wife expect to be here the last of this week and you tell me that you have been informed that Joe Irving and Governor Hartley are coming down, although I have not heard of this and rather doubt it. If Joe Irving and Hartley and Mark Reed and Alex Polson all get together down here, I am sure it will be an old fashioned bull fight before the crowd disburses, if one can judge by rumbles of ill feeling which has existed in this group during the past year or two.

I have been more than amazed by the weather you have had during January in western Washington and am especially disturbed over the situation down at Longview, where they have a foot of ice in the Columbia River. When it gets ready to go out we have \$100,000 worth of river improvements which will have to take a baptism worse than any I have ever heard of on Columbia River in the shape of floating ice and ice jams.

The weather down here is simply ideal and better than I expected to find it. So far this week it is very similar to the best week that you would have in Puget Sound country during either July or August, the highest temperature ranging from 65 to 74 and the lowest from 40 to 45 and with bright clear skies. How long it will remain that way is not a doubtful question with the people who live here and they say that February will be the best month in the year.





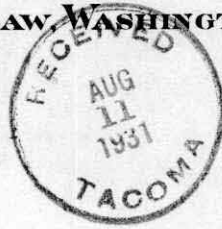

This is the mission of Governor Hartley as he left the congressional party here, after accompanying it from Seattle.

Himself a lumberman and many times a critic of federal conservation policies, the governor became an apostle of the "save-the-trees" movement, as he saw logging operations started a short distance east of Enumclaw in the heavy standing timber lining the National Park Highway.

S. H. Hedges, president of the Washington State Chamber of Commerce, and Asahel Curtis, chairman of the Rainier National Park advisory board, when the party arrived here urged the advantage of saving this timber, among the finest lining any highway in the state. They found the governor already a convert to the plan.

"I am going back to Olympia immediately, see who owns the land, and ask the attorney general if the state has power, without waiting for any new laws, to save it," the governor said.







Annual Report

We enclose herewith copy of the annual report of White River Lumber Company for the year 1930. You will remember that we acquired our interest in this company as of January 1st, 1930 and therefore this is their first annual report.

During the year 1930 we have installed, as nearly as possible, the Weyerhaeuser system of accounting and cost finding, as you will note from the results and form of the statement.

The operations for the year 1930 were all carried on in the original plant of the White River Lumber Company; the new construction having commenced some time during the latter part of the year and the new plant will be in operation about the first of March this year.

In connection with the logging costs will call your attention to the fact that White River Lumber Company has no real log scale according to the standards of our other companies, the scale which they use being practically the full deck scaled which permitted only 2-1/10% overrun for the year. Therefore their log costs based on this scale are not comparable with the log costs of our other companies based on a log scale which permits an overrun of from 14 to 30 per cent.

In addition to the above differences the White River Lumber Company has in past years pursued a policy of charging directly to expense a large number of items which our companies depreciate or spread over future operations in some other manner. Their branch and spur line construction has been charged off each year as built and very little work of this nature was put in during the year 1930. In addition their equipment and plant accounts are fairly well depreciated out and in some cases there was no further depreciation to take.

Will call attention to the average selling prices reflected on Page 31 and will advise that these are net prices after deducting estimated freights and not actual freights. They have always carries "underweights" as a separate profit and this Mr. Long allowed them to do for the year 1930. The underweights are added to the total selling price received at the bottom of Page 31 and also on Page 12.

Will also call your attention to Page 37 on which we have explained the manner in which they price their lumber inventory. At the time the new company was organized this question was referred to Mr. Clapp who advised that he felt we should continue their present basis of inventorying at least until the Government had forced us to change. It is rather doubtful if this company would have shown a profit at all had both its opening and closing lumber inventories been calculated on the basis used by our other companies due to the rather sharp decline in market values December 31, 1930.

When Mr. Bingham came to us and made us a proposition to sell our lumber after he told us of his experience, I was struck with the idea that he would be a good man for you. For this reason I wanted him to see you. I am not able to give you any facts about the reason for leaving Krauss but this is what he told us: He was sent to Florida to work up a demand for lumber along the Coast and Islands of the Caribbean Sea and Gulf of Mexico. He said he worked up a big demand for fir and finally Krauss split the territory which cut down Bingham's commission and he became dissatisfied and broke with Krauss.

I understand he received as compensation a commission but Bingham had to stand a portion of the losses he made in charged off accounts. After the conference he had

with you in Tacoma he went back to Seattle and probably told Krauss that he had seen you. Krauss was not willing that he should go to work for you but if he would sell lumber for White River inland, Krauss would cancel the debt Bingham owed him.

All the above I cannot substantiate and may not be the facts so I want you to keep it very confidential.

When Mr. Bingham came here, Mr. Gossard and I both felt he was a good worker and the little time he has been with us and considering the off season and that he is a stranger, has done better than our old men.

He is probably no financier and I know he is hard up. A few days ago we received a letter from him stating that a new baby arrived so in case he is to travel to meet Colonel Long, you probably will have to send him a check. We of course would not hinder him from doing better so anytime you want him we will be glad to release him.
