Ecologia





The FHS Board of Directors met at FHS in Durham, NC for their annual fall meeting on October 31-November 1, 2025.



This Month in Forest History



• October 1, 1909: The <u>Forest Products Laboratory</u> begins operation in Madison, Wisconsin.

Also in October:

• October 8, 1871: The Peshtigo Fire breaks out in northeastern Wisconsin.

- October 14, 1994: The American Forest & Paper Association (AF&PA) Board of
 Directors adopts "Sustainable Forestry Initiative Principles and Implementation
 Guidelines." Designed as a code of conduct for the U.S. forest products industry,
 the program would become one of the world's largest sustainable forestry and
 certification programs.
- October 17, 1916: The <u>Pisgah National Forest</u> is established. This was the first forest created almost entirely from the purchase of privately-owned land (Vanderbilt's Biltmore Forest) and the first forest established in the East under the Weeks Act.
- October 28, 1921: The <u>Appalachian Section of the Society of American Foresters</u> is organized at a meeting of 15 foresters in Asheville, NC. J.S. Holmes is elected the first president.
